## --6. Call for chapters (edited volume)

For a volume on "**Configurational Analysis in Entrepreneurship, Innovation and Technology Research**" to be published with Springer as part of the FGF Studies in Small Business and Entrepreneurship series (<u>http://www.springer.com/series/13382</u>); it will be edited by Andreas Kuckertz and Elisabeth Berger, University of Hohenheim, Germany.

This volume aims at providing a forum for the discussion of the configurational approach in the context of entrepreneurship, innovation and technology and also at developing to be a standard reference in the rising field of the application and advancement of the configurational approach. We invite papers with different theoretical concepts and methods, in order to assemble a rich, vibrant and multi-faceted collection of studies following a configurational approach and bringing together diverse perspectives. Theoretical contributions will be considered as well as empirical papers. Apart from configurational methods such as qualitative comparative analysis and cluster analysis, we also welcome adjacent methods capturing complexity.

Recommended Topics include, but are not limited to: Applications of configurational methods and theory in entrepreneurship, innovation and technology research; Evaluation of configurational methods in the context of entrepreneurship, innovation and technology; Trends and challenges in the application of QCA; Large N QCA analysis in entrepreneurship, innovation and technology research; Cluster Analysis; MSDO/MDSO; Dealing with complexity and contingency in entrepreneurship, innovation and technology; Multidimensional factors of influence on entrepreneurship, innovation and technology and challenges for policy makers following from these influences; Cross-country, comparative, multi-effect studies.

**Submission Procedure:** Researchers are invited to submit on or before **October 30, 2014**, a 2-3 page chapter proposal clearly explaining the mission and concerns of his or her proposed chapter. Authors of accepted proposals will be notified by November 30, 2014 about the status of their proposals and sent chapter guidelines. Full chapters are expected to be submitted by March 30, 2015. All submitted chapters will be reviewed on a double-blind review basis. Contributors may also be requested to serve as reviewers for this project.
